Make Your Mark Essentials

This UK wide consultation seeks the views of 11-18 year olds on the issues mattering most to them. It usually decides what the UK Youth Parliament debates in the House of Commons, where the new campaign is decided.

Elections

Members of Youth Parliament (MYPs) are elected every 2 years by other young people in their local area. Any 11-17 year old can stand or vote in the election (so long as they have not turned 19 before the 8th March 2026). The next elections are due to take place **in February 2024 for North Yorkshire**.

In England and Wales, we work with local councils who run elections and support young people to be involved locally and at a UK level. Taking part in the UK Youth Parliament is voluntary for councils, while most elect MYPs some do not.

MYP's are party-neutral.

Council managed: schools, colleges or youth groups register with Chloe Thwaites, tally sheets/ballot papers are sent (either directly by BYC or to the Council for local distribution). Ballot papers/tally sheets are returned to North Yorkshire Council for counting and results

• **Youth-led**: the youth council is provided with ballot papers/tally sheets and run the vote in their tutor groups or informally during breaks. Votes are counted and submitted to BYC via an online form, • Self-managed by the school/college/youth group led: particularly the case where the local council isn't involved in the UK Youth Parliament programme. Schools/colleges/youth groups register online and they are then sent resources/online voting/downloadable. They vote then submit the results via the online form.


