Digital Devices

- These are made available directly to schools through the DfE. All secondary schools should have been invited to order through the 'Get help with technology' service. The DfE will invite primary schools to order by 15 January at the latest, starting with the most disadvantaged areas in England. The DfE will contact each school as soon as they can order. - A small number of devices were provided through NYCC for eligible vulnerable and disadvantaged students in 2020. If these devices need to be allocated to different students due to a change in circumstances then please contact richard.benstead@northyorks.gov.uk.

Update on minimum hours for remote learning

The remote education (which can be a balance of online and offline activity) provided should be equivalent in length to the core teaching pupils would receive in school and will include both recorded **or** live direct teaching time, and time for pupils to complete tasks and assignments independently. The amount of remote education provided should be, as a minimum:

- -Key Stage 1: 3 hours a day on average across the cohort, with less for younger children
- -Key Stage 2: 4 hours a day
- -Key Stages 3 and 4: 5 hours a day

Update on Critical Workers information

There has been an update in the critical worker <u>Critical Workers Update-8th Jan</u> Updated 'Critical workers' section to clarify that parents and carers who are critical workers should keep their children at home, if they can.
