Arts Mark CPD



We have been working with IVE from Leeds to

put together a package for schools interested in Arts Mark. Earlier in March we put on an online CPD session available to all schools, looking at the benefits and process of Arts Mark. IVE have set up an offer in partnership with the Music Service.

In this new consortium, schools who register for Artsmark will receive ongoing, bespoke support for their Artsmark journey from IVE and meet, as a collective, up to six times per year in Peer network sessions to share knowledge, support one another and develop creative skills. In addition, North Yorkshire Music Hub will provide access to a range of additional support to develop music provision in settings.

Platinum Jubilee Concert

On 17th June the Music Service and North Yorkshire Schools will come together at the Harrogate International Conference Centre for a concert to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.

Excitingly we will be joined by the Band of the Grenadier Guards who will be performing with our musicians. Over 200 primary school children will make up a massed choir and will be singing songs from the 50s to the present day. Musicians from the County Youth Big Band, Harrogate Youth Jazz

Orchestra and a wind band made up of pupils from Harrogate and Selby Music Centres will also perform.

The concert will include pieces from the Coronation and many well-known favourites. We will also reflect on the extraordinary work carried out over the pandemic by so many NYCC staff.

This should be a memorable occasion. Tickets will be available shortly.



Free CPD For Schools

We recently put on three online CPD sessions for both secondary schools and primary schools. The sessions were led by Liz Stafford.

Dr Elizabeth Stafford is an internationally-recognised music education expert with over two decade's experience as a Primary Music Teacher in numerous school and local authority settings. Elizabeth is Director of Music Education Solutions®, a global music education company which has trained and supported thousands of music teachers across the world. She is also Editor of Primary Music Magazine, a reviewer for the British Journal of Music Education, and writes regularly for Music Teacher Magazine.

The sessions covered the new Model Music Curriculum and teaching mixed year group classes, which obviously poses a real problem when trying to adopt a progressive curriculum. The sessions were well attended with over 60 primary schools represented as well as 15 secondary schools.

As part of a collaboration with East Riding Music Hub we were able to share this CPD offer.

Scarborough Music Centre

Scarborough Music Centre reopened its doors in September in full, for the first time since March 2020. We had reinstated some of the smaller ensembles during the summer term of 2021 but September saw our grand reopening. It was great for us to be back rehearsing again, and to notice just how much the students had not only improved in their playing but how much taller they all were! Initially our beginner ensembles were a bit low on numbers, seeing as we had gone 18 months without recruiting any new members and those that were in these ensembles were now in groups that are more senior. However, we have seen a steady influx of new members joining us since we reopened and hope to see this continue.

We have also relaunched our offer of free violin lessons on Saturday mornings, and the take up for this has been extremely encouraging with around 35 children coming in to take advantage of this. We hope that this will help to boost the number of string players in the Scarborough area.

On 11th December, we held our Gala Christmas Concert at Queen St Methodist Church in Scarborough where all of our eight ensembles performed. Parents, Staff and the students were all amazed to hear the high standards achieved, after such a short time following a long closure. We were all very proud of them.

At the time of writing we are looking forward to a concert for our string groups and wind ensemble (Ebony) at South Cliff Methodist Church, Scarborough on 19th March, as well as our 37th Annual Boyes Celebrity Concert at Scarborough Spa on 2nd April, where our bands will be working with, and performing alongside the Alison Rayner Quintet (ARQ).

Sleights Church of England (VC) Primary School, Whitby

A quick success story from Sleights C of E (VC) Primary School in Whitby! Their "Discoverers" class of year 4 and 5s started to learn how to play woodwind and brass instruments back in September 2021 as part of a Whole Class Music project, provided by the NYCC Music Service with sessions delivered by Ralph Alder, Scarborough Music Centre Manager.

The class of 30 children took up learning Clarinet, Saxophone, Trumpet and Trombone with great gusto. Even their class teacher Mrs Taylor wanted to learn an instrument alongside her class, so joins in on Saxophone each week for the hour session! On Monday 7th March they took part in the Eskdale Festival of the Arts at Whitby Spa, and actually won their class, achieving first place in the "year 6 and under, primary class band" section. Following this splendid result, they were invited back on the evening of Saturday 12th March to perform in the Gala Winners' Concert. Everyone at Sleights School are immensely proud of their achievements and progress after such a short time learning to play their instruments in a whole class setting. Well done Discoverers, the performance at the Spa will be an experience that will stay with you for the rest of your lives!

Harrogate Music Centre

January saw the return of

At the beginning of March, HYJO (Harrogate Youth Jazz Orchestra) made their first ever appearance at the Great North Big Band Festival. The festival is in its 19th year and draws bands from across the North of England and even a band or two from Scotland.

The Harrogate Youth Jazz Orchestra (HYJO) enjoyed a fantastic day at the annual Great North Big Band Festival. This is the 19th time the festival has run but a first appearance at the festival for the group from Harrogate Music Centre.

The event held at Chester-le-Street on Sunday 6th March brought together bands from all over the North of England. HYJO were performing in the Youth band category alongside 10 other groups.

The band performed a high difficulty programme with a mixture of music from classic Big Band repertoire through to very modern contemporary writing. And they performed it brilliantly receiving faultless feedback from the judges who rightly praised the maturity and style of the band.

HYJO were then very fortunate to receive two of the five awards presented and a very worthy 2nd overall place finish. The eventually winners were Wigan Youth Jazz Orchestra but it was a close run thing.

The two awards given were for "Best Programme" and "Best Percussionist/Drummer" which went to HYJO stalwart Max Williams, who was rightly praised for his

Musical Journeys: A Day at the Pond / Mausam

Sounding Out

NYMAZ recently hosted an Afro-Cuban music workshop at Skipton Music Centre with award-winning pianist, composer and producer Kishon Khan alongside long-time collaborator, trombonist and composer Justin Thurgur. The project was coordinated by NYMAZ's intern, Imogen Hart, who is a post-graduate music student at University of Hull.

A group of 15 musicians attending the centre explored Cuban rhythms and melodies alongside Kishon and Justin, and put them into practice through learning the piece Oye Como Va, written by Latin jazz and mambo musician Tito Puente. After playing with the different layers and sections of this song, they introduced some improvisation. Every single player contributed an improvised solo, and by the end of the session, the group gave an impressive performance to staff from the centre!

Kishon and Justin have created some video content exploring more Cuban music, and NYMAZ will be releasing this soon. We will also be scheduling future Sounding Out workshops with some incredible musicians, exploring diverse genres from around the world.
