Statutory assessment update



At the end of last week, the Department for Education (DfE) published their <u>annual statistical</u> <u>summary of Education, Health and Care Plans (EHCPs)</u> in England. This shows that the total number of Education, Health and Care (EHC) plans has continued to increase with the number of children and young people with EHC plans at 473,300 as at January 2022.

North Yorkshire County Council currently has 4,065 EHCPs, a 12.4% increase since the same point in 2021, and 500 assessments for Plans are currently underway. In recognition of this increase, we are working towards increasing the capacity of the team and also evaluating our current structures and processes to ensure that these are as streamlined and effective as possible for families and schools. As you'll be aware, there is a statutory responsibility for EHCPs to be reviewed within 12 months to ensure that the Plan remains current, so that we are achieving the best outcomes for children and young people. Before Easter we sent the list of pupils whose Annual Reviews are due in the Summer Term, along with any children who have not had an Annual Review within the last 12 months so that these could be prioritised with urgency. Thank you for your support in doing this.

I have also recently written to Headteachers regarding Annual Reviews, with a list of pupils at each school whose Annual Reviews are overdue. The purpose of this was to identify the reasons for delay including any barriers to organising the review meeting, and also to confirm the planned date of Annual Review. Thank you for all of your responses to this. There are some responses still outstanding. **Please prioritise this for action.**

As you'll be aware, following a SENDIST dispute in Devon in March 2022, the ruling was that LAs must notify the parent or young person of a decision to amend the EHC Plan and what the proposed changes actually are **within four weeks of the Annual Review meeting**. The final EHC plan must be issued as soon as practicable and no later than 8 weeks after this. Therefore, the LA must send the parent or young person the final amended EHC plan within a maximum of 12 weeks of the annual review meeting. Please make sure you are keeping these timescales in mind in co-ordinating your Annual Review meetings.

Digital EHCPs

We are well on-track with the roll-out of our Digital EHCPs. This will provide many benefits, including improvements in efficiency of collaboration and information sharing and a reduction in bureaucracy; giving children and young people and their parents and carers more agency in the planning process; enabling EHCPs to be updated iteratively so they are live and reflect current need and allowing for improved data collection both in terms of tracking of individual progress, and analysis of trends in the prevalence of need and support and provision made available. These will be launched in two stages, with the digital platform going live in Hambleton and Richmondshire from 20th June, and all other localities from September. We are currently giving the system a final test run-through before the launch. Information about training and support for schools will be shared over the next week, and in the meantime please do contact me if you have any questions.

SEND Champions in Health

What is a SEND Champion?

A SEND Champion group has been created by North Yorkshire and York CCGs. The champions are a group of enthusiastic and motivated clinicians who all want to improve SEND services and support in their area of health.

What do SEND Champions do?

Their job is to share information with staff and leaders, support staff with writing advice for EHCPs and checking the advice before it is sent to the Special Educational Needs Team at City of York Council. Each person will lead on one area of work, e.g. Voice and Participation, Quality Assurance, Training, Local Offer and Website Updates.

Who are the Locality Boards and what do they do?

There are 5 Locality Boards (LBs) across North Yorkshire, they are a partnership arrangement between education providers and North Yorkshire County Council (in particular, Inclusion Team and School Improvement Team). The boards take collective responsibility for maximising outcomes for children and young people (aged 0 – 25) and embedding a strong culture of inclusion. The LB members include Early Years Leaders, Post 16 Leaders, Headteachers / CEOs from Primary, Secondary, Special and PRU and NYCC Officers from Inclusion and School Improvement teams.

The 5 LBs cover the following geographical areas;

- Craven
- Hambleton and Richmondshire
- •Harrogate, Knaresborough and Ripon
- ·Scarborough, Whitby, Filey and Ryedale
- Selby

LBs fund projects that can directly help you support your children and young people and they will let you know the projects they are running in a variety of ways including through email, this newsletter and via the SENCo Network. Why start a TMP?

We currently have 7 targeted mainstream provisions open across North Yorkshire, with 3 more opening in the Autumn term.

Our aim is to have Communication & Interaction and SEMH provisions across Primary and Secondary settings in all localities.

Did you know?

Each TMP has 8 places for pupils – 6 permanent and 2 flexible places

There is a start up fund to help with new resources

Each TMP is supported by a bespoke training package, to support whole school and TMP staff

There is also a therapeutic offer, including Educational Psychology time, Speech and Language support and Occupational Therapy time
